THE UNIVERSITY



Founded on September 11, 1911, Middle Tennessee State University is the oldest, largest, and fastest-growing public university in central Tennessee. For the past eight years, MTSU has been the number one college choice of midstate high school valedictorians and salutatorians in an independent survey.

The University has a long history of and commitment to educating middle Tennesseans. With a current enrollment of over 22,000 students, MTSU educates more people in this region than any other school. More than 90 percent of students are Tennessee residents, and the majority remain in middle Tennessee after graduation. Of almost 70,000 alumni, approximately 77 percent live in Tennessee.

Since its establishment, the University has changed considerably, growing from a 100-acre campus with 125 students and 19 faculty members to a 500-acre campus with more than 850 faculty members.

A comprehensive university, MTSU offers more than 140 undergraduate programs in its five colleges—Basic and Applied Sciences, Business, Education and Behavioral Science, Liberal Arts, and Mass Communication—and some 65 graduate programs, including doctoral degrees.

Middle Tennessee State University has revised its comprehensive, institution-wide Academic Master Plan to

achieve three primary objectives: attainment of notable academic quality, development of a student-centered learning environment, and establishment of partnerships with institutions and businesses.

Over \$200 million in construction projects have been completed on campus during the past ten years. The newest endeavor, the Paul W. Martin Sr. Honors Building, opened in January 2004. During the 2004-05 school year, 10 student-athletes were enrolled in the Honors College.

A teachers college in its earliest days, MTSU still educates more teachers than any other school in Tennessee. The University also has one of the largest recording industry programs in the nation; strong programs in business, aerospace, and agriscience; and a nationally recognized graduate program in public history. Among MTSU's graduates are a Nobel Laureate; a National Teacher of the Year; a U.S. Senator; U.S. Congress members; state legislators; scientists; artists; engineers; and Grammy, Emmy, and Peabody award winners. A May 2000 music graduate, Alysa Cannon, holds the distinction of being the first MTSU student to participate in the Fulbright Scholar Program; she completed a year of research and study in Spain. Biology major Eric Freundt recently

became the first MTSU graduate to be admitted to the graduate program at the University of Oxford in Great Britain.

Academic programs are enriched through the establishment of chairs dedicated to the support of particular disciplines. Funded by gifts to the University Foundation, the Martin Chair of Insurance and the Weatherford Chair of Finance are administered through the Economics and Finance Department. MTSU houses nine Chairs of Excellence, established with a combination of private, University, and state funds. They are the Jennings A. Jones Chair in Free Enterprise, the Jennings and Rebecca Jones Chair in Urban and Regional Planning, the John Seigenthaler Chair in First Amendment Studies, the Dr. Carl Adams Chair in Health Care Services, the National HealthCare Chair in Nursing, the Robert E. and Georgianna West Russell Chair in Manufacturing Excellence, the Katherine Davis Murfree Chair in Dyslexic Studies, the John C. Miller Chair in Equine Reproductive Physiology, and the Mary E. Miller Chair in Equine Health.

MTSU is also the site of two Centers of Excellence established by the Tennessee General Assembly—the Center for Historic Preservation and the Center for Popular Music. Another boon to scholars is the Albert Gore Sr. Research Center, a repository of manuscripts and other materials.

Did You Know ...

- Middle Tennessee was the second school in the nation to participate in "Up Til Dawn," a fundraiser for St. Jude Children's Hospital. Last year nearly \$50,000 was raised; the goal for 2005 is \$60,000.
- Of students receiving bachelor's degrees, 58% are female, 42% are male. Master's, 65% female, 35% male. Doctoral, 33% female, 67% male.
- 1,300 members make up 27 fraternities and sororities on campus that contribute more than 20,000 hours of community service each year.
- Middle Tennessee has over 70,000 alumni and nearly 25,000 live in Davidson (11,614) and Rutherford Co. (13,139) combined.

PRESIDENT SIDNEY MCPHEE



Dr. Sidney A. McPhee is the tenth president of Middle Tennessee State University. Prior to his appointment at

MTSU in 2001, he was executive vice chancellor at the Tennessee Board of Regents (TBR) in Nashville. In addition, he served as chief academic officer and interim chancellor for the Board of Regents System. Before his appointment at TBR, McPhee served in various administrative capacities at several major universities including University of Louisville and University of Memphis.

McPhee earned his B.A. degree from Prairie View A&M University; a master's degree from the University of Miami, Coral Gables, Florida; and a doctorate in Applied Behavioral Studies in Education from Oklahoma State University. He is also a graduate of the Harvard University Management Development Program and has completed professional development programs at St. Mary's University of San Antonio, Texas, and Colorado College in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

As an academician, President McPhee's scholarly publications and presentations are extensive. His publications have appeared in local, national, and international professional journals.

In addition, he is the senior author of a college textbook, *Understanding the Campus Culture: An Introduction to College*, and has co-authored a chap-

ter for a major college textbook on academic advising. McPhee's scholarly pursuits include several international visits and presentations in locations such as Beijing, China; Penang, Malaysia; Tokyo and Osaka, Japan; Seoul, Korea; Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, Israel; Antwerp, Belgium; Montreal, Canada; Oxford, England; and Nassau, Bahamas.

McPhee currently serves on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors and the NCAA Executive Committee. In May 2005, he was appointed to the NCAA Presidential Commission on the Future of Intercollegiate Athletics. In 2002, President George W. Bush appointed him to serve on the National Council for the Humanities, and the U.S. Senate confirmed him. He is a member of a variety of community boards.

Since McPhee's arrival at MTSU, the University has experienced significant growth in student enrollment and new academic degrees at the undergraduate and graduate levels. Guiding these changes is a new academic master plan focusing on three strategic areas: strengthening academic quality, forging partnerships with business and industry, and creating a student-centered environ-

ment. For the first time, four Ph.D. programs were established, and several new undergraduate programs were launched. Since 2001, MTSU has seen an increase in research funds,



federal funding, and in philanthropic donations.

In addition to the increase in new academic programs, the University has been successful

in raising admission standards, resulting in an increase in high-quality students. For the past eight consecutive years, MTSU has been the institution of choice for midstate valedictorians and salutatorians. During the past two years, MTSU has enrolled a significant number of National Merit scholars and Achievement scholars. Great progress has been made in academic accomplishments of student athletes. The graduation rate for athletes exceeds that of the general student population and several conference championships have been won.

McPhee's tenure has seen major improvements in campus facilities. A ten-year, \$70 million housing renovation project is in its second year and includes the refurbishing of all residential facilities. Over \$9 million was spent to renovate Todd Hall, which now houses the Art Department and has state-of-the-art equipment for its students and faculty. New facilities completed include "Tennessee" Miller Coliseum, the Paul W. Martin Sr. Honors Building, the Kennon Sports Hall of Fame, and the Wood-Stegall Building, housing the Office of Development. Presently, the University is involved in proposed or active capital projects totaling nearly \$300 million.

President McPhee is married to Elizabeth McPhee and they have two children, Seneca and Sidney-Anthony.





DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS CHRIS MASSARO



On April 8, 2005, Chris Massaro was named the sixth director of athletics in school history, and if the hustle and bustle of

relocating from Columbia, S.C., where he served as Associate Athletics Director for 20 years, was not enough, he immediately was faced with head-on decisions before he even had an opportunity to settle into his new location.

Two days following his announcement, Massaro was pressed into action as he immediately started working on a replacement for outgoing women's basketball coach Stephany Smith. While working the country for candidates, Massaro was also dealt a football scheduling change that included the Blue Raiders and more than a hand full of other teams.

Massaro made his first hire when he brought onboard legendary high school coach Rick Insell to take over the women's basketball program. Shortly thereafter, Massaro orchestrated a new 2005 football schedule that included a game at NC State in late November. In return, Middle Tennessee received a home game against Virginia for the 2007 season. The Cavaliers will be the first ACC program to ever visit Floyd Stadium and could very possibly be the first nationally-ranked opponent to make their way to Murfreesboro.

His work did not stop there as he quickly made his second hire in early June when he


brought on board a new women's tennis coach in Alison Ojeda, while working out a new radio deal to bring Blue Raider football and men's basketball back to local station WGNS 1450.

As Senior Associate Athletic Director at South Carolina, Massaro provided significant leadership to the department. He became a senior staff member in 1994.

At South Carolina, Massaro oversaw the men's basketball program, all aspects of the department's ticket operations and group sales, helped coordinate the department's marketing efforts and was involved in all aspects surrounding the planning, building, marketing, and opening of the \$60 million 18,000-seat Carolina Center. Massaro also

was responsible for football scheduling and negotiating game contracts.

The Glenwood Springs, Co., native joined the Gamecock staff under the Ohio University sport administration pro-




gram in 1985. Massaro worked in virtually every area of the Gamecock Athletic Department and was part of its tremendous growth and rise to national prominence. During his time at USC, Massaro helped usher the Gamecocks into the Southeastern Conference and learned under legendary athletic director Dr. Mike McGee where he rose to Senior Associate AD.

Massaro, 44, earned his bachelor's degree in Business Administration from the University of Northern Colorado in 1983 and his Master's degree in Sport Administration from Ohio University in 1986. At UNC, Massaro was a five-year football team member.

A 1994 graduate of the Sports Management Institute, Massaro has had experience in developing SMI's class programming on different occasions while also serving on the Executive Committee. The SMI is a cooperative educational effort between the Schools of Business and the Athletic Departments from Notre Dame, Texas, Michigan, Southern California, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

Massaro and his wife, Cindy, have four children: Hank (10), Lainey (9), Rachel (6) and Ben (5).

Larry Counts has made Middle Tennessee a family affair during his tenure in the Middle Tennessee

athletic department. He, his wife, and his son have all left a mark on the program and continue to do so.

Counts, who has worked in the athletic department for 17 years, is in his eighth year as associate athletic director. His duties include game day operations, facility management, licensing coordination, concessions management, and serving as the liaison between the Athletic Department and the Tennessee Secondary Schools Athletic Association.

In 2000, Counts was selected by Sun Belt Conference Commissioner Wright Waters to serve as tournament manager for the 2001 Sun Belt Conference Basketball Championships in Mobile, Ala., and he has served in that capacity in each tournament since that time.

After 12 years as executive director of the Blue Raider Athletic Association, the organization's members recognized Counts in 1998 for his outstanding achievements. Counts founded the BRAA in 1987.

Counts oversaw the design process, budget management, and construction of the \$27 million football stadium renovation. More recently, Counts orchestrated the \$1 million renovation of the new football locker room and training facility completed prior to the 2001 football season.

During the last decade, Counts has been responsible for developing a business plan and managing the operation of bringing concessions in-house, developing and administering a licensing program, and developing and coordinating a plan for selling advertising signage at Blue Raider athletic facilities, among other projects.

A lifelong resident of Murfreesboro, Tennessee, Counts is married to Wynnfred, who works as the assistant director of Athletic Advisement. The couple has one son, Wes, who finished his football career during 2001 as the school's all-time passing leader in every category. In his spare time, Counts enjoys woodworking, auto racing, radio controlled cars and airplanes, and model railroading.

ALAN FARLEY

Alan Farley is in his second year as assistant athletic director/Fundraising. Farley, a 1992 Middle

Tennessee graduate, handles all the day-to-day operations in the Blue Raider Athletic Association fundraising office.

Farley, an active member of the BRAA, has spent the past six years running his own consulting firm in Nashville, Tenn. The firm deals with fundraising, government relations, public relations, and political campaign strategies. During that time, he has written and managed fundraising plans that have raised more than \$3.2 million.

Prior to running his consulting firm, Farley spent 12 years in management with the United Parcel Service.

A lifelong resident of Murfreesboro, Tenn., Farley is currently a vice chairman for the Rutherford County Industrial Bond Development Board and the Rutherford County Health and Education Facilities Board. Farley also serves on the Board of Directors for Cookeville, Tenn., based LINC Preferred Group, Inc.

MARK MEADOWS

Assistant AD

3rd Year/Alabama '78



Mark Meadows, who is Middle Tennessee's assistant athletic director for marketing and

corporate sales, begins his third year in Murfreesboro.

Meadows made his way to Murfreesboro after serving as the assistant vice president and general manager for International Sports Properties at Southern Mississippi. During his stint at Southern Mississippi, Meadows coordinated all marketing and broadcast activities for the Golden Eagle athletic department. He also supervised a staff responsible for multimedia sales, event promotions, and the production and distribution of the school's radio network and game programs.

Prior to his tenure at Southern Mississippi, Meadows was the director of special projects for a joint venture between ISP and Learfield Communications at the University of Alabama from Jan. 1998 to Jan. 2000. While at Alabama, Meadows managed several projects, including vending operations at home athletic events, the merchandise catalog, retail product development, and the CTSM Hospitality Village.

Before assuming his duties with ISP/Learfield, Meadows sold radio, television, scoreboard, and print advertising for the Crimson Tide from June 1990 to Dec. 1997.

From April 1993 to Jan. 1998, Meadows acted as the vice president of Collegiate Sports Partners, Ltd. In his role at Collegiate Sports Partners, he developed sales, marketing, and publishing opportunities for clients in Alabama. Among his clients were the University of Alabama, the Alabama High School Athletic Association, and the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame. Meadows later moved into a role as



the VP and general manager of CSP's University of Alabama project working more directly with the Crimson Tide athletic department.

Meadows got his start in collegiate athletics with Host Communications, selling print and broadcast advertising on behalf of the University of Alabama and the SEC.

Aside from his career in athletics, he has also served as a commissioned officer in the Alabama Army National Guard for 27 years. His current assignment is as a logistics planning officer (LTC) with the 167th TSC.

A Tuscaloosa, Ala, native, Meadows earned his B.A. in communications from Alabama in 1978. During his time as a student at Alabama, Meadows served as a student manager for the football team, eventually becoming the team's head manager during his senior year.

MIKE MOLETA
Director of Compliance
4th Year/Southern Miss '97



Entering his fourth year in the Middle Tennessee athletic department, Mike Moleta serves as the

director of compliance.

Moleta came to MT from Northern Arizona University, where he served in the same capacity. While a member of the Lumberjack athletic department, Moleta also held the position of director of operations for tennis and golf.

Moleta's career in compliance began at Southern Mississippi, where he was an honors graduate in the sports administration program. He began working in the USM athletic department as a student assistant to the athletic director in 1996 and became the school's assistant compliance director in 1997. Moleta then took over as the associate athletic director for compliance in 1998, holding that position until

moving on to NAU in 2001.

Moleta's academic career was distinguished: he received the Sports Administration Distinguished Leadership Award and the D.C. Leach Academic Scholarship Award. He also received the U.S. Army's Achievement Medal twice during his four-year stint in the military. After leaving the service in 1984, Moleta was awarded the Biloxi Chamber of Commerce Customer Service Award and the Executive Leadership Award before beginning his academic pursuits at Southern Mississippi.

Away from the office, Moleta is active in coaching youth baseball and is a member of both the National Association of Compliance Directors and the Collegiate Athletic Business Managers Association. A native of Biloxi, Miss., Mike and his wife Pam are the parents of two children, Kirsten and Chandler.

JOHNNY MOORE
Asst. AD/Olympic Sports
17th Year/Middle Tennessee '61



Beginning his 17th year at Middle Tennessee, Johnny Moore has been an invaluable resource

for the athletic department. He is in his eighth year as assistant athletic director/coordinator of Olympic sports. He also continues to coach the Blue Raider men's golf team.

As coordinator of Olympic sports, Moore oversees all administrative facets of baseball, golf, and tennis.

Moore was one of three former Middle Tennessee athletes inducted into the Blue Raider Hall of Fame in June 2001. He was selected for his football accomplishments and joined Howard Alsup (football) and Greg Artis (track) as inductees.

During his tenure as head coach of the men's golf team, Moore has led the Blue Raiders to five Ohio Valley Conference titles and six other tournament titles since 1989. Moore was also named OVC Coach of the Year

three consecutive years: 1994, '95, and '96. He won the honor again in 1998 and 2000.

A native of Nashville, Moore graduated from Middle Tennessee in 1961. As a student-athlete, he was a star in both golf and football. As a big, rangy halfback, Moore played in the Blue Raiders 21-12 Tangerine (now Citrus) Bowl victory over Presbyterian in 1960. Moore is also a two-time Nashville Metropolitan Open Champion and one of the top-rated amateur golfers in the state of Tennessee. He qualified for and participated in the 1990 United States Senior Open, which was won by Lee Trevino.

For 31 years, Moore has been a member of the Tennessee Golf Association Board of Directors. He is a former president and now serves on the Executive Board of Directors. Nine years ago, he was appointed to the Sectional Affairs Committee of the United States Golf Association.

Moore is married to the former Andrea Jo Lehning. The couple has four children—Laura, Anne Marie, Johnny, and Mike—and two grandchildren. The Moores live in Murfreesboro and are members of Belle Aire Baptist Church.

MARK OWENS
Asst. AD/Media Relations
8th Year/Virginia Tech '89



Mark Owens is in his eighth year as Middle Tennessee's media relations director and sixth as assis-

tant athletic director. Owens is also involved in sales.

Since his arrival on campus, Owens has been instrumental in doubling the size of the media relations staff, improving the quality and quantity of the department's publications, and overseeing the launch of the award-winning official athletics Web site. The Tennessee Sports Writers Association voted Owens' 2001 Blue Raider football media guide best in the state of Tennessee. In 2002, Owens engineered Middle Tennessee's first-



ever Heisman Trophy campaign with Dwone Hicks that garnered the University national attention.

A 1989 graduate of Virginia Tech, Owens spent seven years at the University of Memphis as associate media relations director. He joined the U of M staff in 1991 and handled the publicity and promotion of Tiger basketball while also assisting with football. In addition, Owens was responsible for the design and layout of football and basketball media guides that won numerous awards, including two national honors.

Owens, a native of Stuart, Virginia, was responsible for the promotional campaigns that landed All-America honors for Anfernee Hardaway, David Vaughn, Lorenzen Wright, and Cedric Henderson. His promotional penny design for Hardaway in 1993 earned national acclaim. Owens also helped promote Tech athletes Will Furrer (for academic All-America honors) and basketball standout Bimbo Coles.

Owens has also served as assistant media coordinator for three conference basketball tournaments and the 1997 NCAA Tournament.

A member of CoSIDA, Owens served on the group's Radio and Television Liaison Committee from 1997 to 1998. He is a member of the University Relations committee at Middle Tennessee and the athletic department's scholarship committee.

In April of 2005, Owens was honored by the All-American Football Foundation with the Scoop Hudgins Outstanding Sports Information Director award.

Owens has a son, Tanner, who is seven years old.

MATT RILEY
Asst. AD/Strength & Cond.
13th Year/Middle Tennessee '88



Matt Riley is assistant athletics director and oversees the strength and conditioning program for

more than 300 student-athletes at

Middle Tennessee. Riley, who is in his 13th year, was also instrumental in the design of the current weight room located adjacent to the football stadium.


A former offensive lineman under former Athletics Director and football coach Boots Donnelly, Riley returned to his alma mater to head up the weight and conditioning program and serve as strength coach in 1993 after heading two other programs following his graduation from Middle Tennessee.

Riley is certified by the International Sports Science Association (ISSA) and CSCCA and is a member of each association as well as the NSCA and MSCC. As a player at Middle Tennessee in the mid-1980s, Riley started on the offensive line of two of the most successful teams in program history. The Blue Raiders advanced into the Division I-AA national semifinals in 1984 and were undefeated and the no. 1-ranked team nationally in 1985.

Riley was an assistant to strength coach Doc Kreis at Middle Tennessee in 1988 before being hired as the head strength and conditioning coach at Tennessee Tech in 1989. He served in that capacity for two years before being named the strength and conditioning coach at Southern Mississippi in 1991, where he worked for two years before returning to his alma mater.

Riley and his wife, Rajayna, have two children, a 7-year-old daughter, Madison Cate, and a 3-year-old son, Jackson Rhoad.

She assumed her Athletic Department duties after spending two years working in the school's Budget Office


as a financial management analyst and assisting with the preparation of the University budget.
